

Today's Problem:

When transferred from Earth's surface to Mars, propellant becomes a mass intensive and time consuming aspect of



The Proposed Solution:

Make the SRP propellant on orbit by capturing and processing the Mars atmosphere (95,5% CO_2) and water (H₂O) from the Mars surface to make abundant propellants (CH₄, O₂) for precision SRP Entry, Descent, Landing and Ascent (EDLA).


Mars Science Laboratory (MSL) = 4.5 m aeroshell + 21.5 m diameter parachute = 0.9 t payload


Larger supersonic parachutes are inhibited by scaling challenges



Supersonic Retro Propulsion (SRP) for EDL **Goals beyond MSL:**

More landed mass (20-40t) Higher landing elevation

20t - 40t payloads on Mars
